Subjects: Stories without words. Counting. Seasons – Juvenile fiction. Country life – Juvenile fiction. Summary: A wordless counting book depicting the growth in a village and surrounding countryside during twelve months.

The art of awareness: how observation can transform your teaching / Curtis, Debbie. Carter, Margie.

St. Paul, MN: Redleaf Press, 2000.

Subjects: Early childhood education. Early childhood teachers. Observation (Educational method). Summary: This inspiring and practical book offers nine observation study sessions that were originally designed as a college course. These sessions provide ideas, activities, and experiences that help early childhood educators to become aware of children in an in-depth and systematic way that will help them to better plan for children's learning experiences.

Authentic childhood : experiencing Reggio Emilia in the classroom (3rd ed.) / Fraser, Susan. Toronto, ON: Nelson, 2012.

Subjects: Early childhood education – Philosophy. Early childhood education – Case studies. Early childhood education – Italy – Reggio Emilia.

Summary: This book focuses on the theory and practice surrounding the Reggio Emilia approach to early childhood education. Reggio Emilia is a child-centred approach where children's curiosity about the environment inspires learning. The book includes descriptions of how two Canadian educators changed their classroom environment and instructional strategies after adopting the Reggio Emilia approach. It also addresses the role of the teacher in working with children from diverse cultural backgrounds.

Summary: With his mother's guidance, a little bear cub learns so much – how to catch a fish, how to climb a tree, how to dig for grubs. Mama is always close to Bearcub to teach and comfort him. This comfortable situation, however, begins to change as Bearcub tests his independence. One day, the little bear cub is alone in the forest when a storm darkens the sky. Bearcub is afraid, but he remembers what his mother has taught him, and he manages to return home safely.

The practice and the theory behind the practice were inspired by teachers from Reggio Emilia, Italy and by the exhibition, "The Hundred Languages of Children." The setting includes two American kindergarten classrooms and one prekindergarten classroom, where the focus is on the process rather than the product.

Then the human does something that Bear does not understand. He raises his axe and begins to chop one of the oldest trees in the forest. For the first time in his life, Bear does not feel like hugging and must make a decision on how to deal with the human – sink his teeth into him or give him a hug.

Summary: This book offers information and strategies for dealing with students' challenging behaviour. The chapter topics include bullying, culture, self-reflection, the brain, resilience, and family partnerships. Vignettes featuring real children bring these strategies to life.



Changing the faces of mathematics: perspectives on Indigenous people of North America / Hankes, Judith Elaine, Fast, Gerald R.

Reston, VA: NCTM, 2002.

Subjects: Mathematics – Study and teaching – Social aspects. Indians of North America – Education. Mathematical ability.

Summary: This resource is a collection of essays related to teaching mathematics in a culturally relevant way to First Nations people of North America. Examples include suggestions for teaching numbers and operations concepts using traditional games, and for introducing students to a variety of number systems specific to North American First Nations people.

Child guidance through play: teaching positive social behaviors (ages 2-7) / Wolfgang, Charles

Subjects: Childhood development. Early childhood education. Play. Behavior modification. Summary: Drawing from the author's 25 years of experience as an instructor in the area of discipline and his work as a principal and an educator of young children, this book provides child guidance theory and strategies for handling challenging behaviour in young children in a play-centred environment. It also provides suggestions for setting limits and developmental methods using play to help children develop their social skills. Vignettes make the key concepts come to life.

Subjects: Hair – Juvenile films. Schools – Juvenile films.

Summary: When young Stanley arrives at school with a wild hairdo, he discovers that he has confused Crazy Hair Day with School Picture Day. After Stanley's classmates laugh at him, he hides in the bathroom. This experience, however, takes a turn for the better when Stanley's best friend and his other classmates support him in a creative way. An entertaining song enlivens the resource, which is based on the book of the same title by Barney Saltzberg.



Creative dance for all ages: a conceptual approach / Gilbert, Anne Green.

Reston, VA: American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance, 1992, 2006. Subjects: Dance for children.

Summary: The author offers theory and methods for planning a creative dance class. Divided into four sections - space, time, force, and body - the methods section provides many suggestions to help make lesson planning and teaching successful. The appendices include assessment tools, information on teaching academic curriculum through the kinesthetic intelligence, music lists, ideas for props, and suggestions for integrating dance with the three other strands of arts education.

The activities are categorized according to warm-ups and games, fitness, movement and gymnastics, rhythms, throwing and catching, dribbling and kicking, striking and volleying, game shows, reality shows, special events, board games, and cool-downs. Each activity entry in the book has an introduction, the equipment required, a description of the activity, the setup, objectives, a warm-up, cues and concepts, assessment ideas, safety tips, ideas for enrichment or modification, a conclusion, and links to real life, as well as ideas for trying the activities at home.



The CD-ROM provides a teacher's guide to assist teachers and students in understanding the Cree worldview and to encourage reflection on their personal worldview through the study of Sapp's images.
