Eighteen years after the end of apartheid, the people of South Africa continue to suffer the effects of racial segregation. The unjust treatment endured by the 'inferior' racial groups caused a social rift that is still apparent. Many black people continue to suffer from the extreme poverty and poor living conditions as a result of the relocation policy implemented during apartheid. The environment has been negatively impacted through overpopulation, high population density in certain areas, urban sprawl, and inefficient industrial waste management. Due to this, there is a lack of available and affordable housing and a very high rate of unemployment, particularly among black people. There is no quick and easy solution to the pain and injustice caused by apartheid. However, there are long term solutions. Accessible, compulsory, and quality education for all is an important beginning. The implementation of programs to improve quality of life and reduce environmental impact is another necessary step.

The system of segregation in South Africa, called apartheid, was implemented in 1948 when the Herenigde Nasionale Party (Reunited National Party) came into power. Led by Daniel Malan, a coalition was formed with the Afrikaner Party, creating a system in which South Africans were divided into four racial groups: white, black, coloured, and indian. The 'superior' white group encompassed the Afrikaans and English language groups. The other three groups were considered inferior. They were separated from the White population through the segregation of many public places and services such as buses, public washrooms, drinking fountains, parks, and even ambulances, hospitals and schools. These segregated services were often of much poorer quality for the 'inferior' racial groups.

Race was monitored through the pass system, in which each person over the age of eighteen was required to carry a 'pass' or identification card detailing his race. People of colour especially could be subject to great brutality from police for not carrying a pass.

During the 1950s, a policy of resettlement was introduced. This was the segregation of living areas and neighborhoods, or even whole cities. Many black people were forced to leave their land and homes to move to overpopulated and crowded 'homelands' and townships. About five million people had to relocate to townships placed in areas deemed unfit for other forms of development. These townships often lacked basic amenities and infrastructure; so many people did not have access to potable water resources or adequate sanitation systems. When apartheid finally ended in 1994, people were unable to regain ownership rights, and continued to live in the overcrowded townships. Apartheid's segregated school system also posed a problem post-apartheid. The education provided in the black schools was inferior, and grade 12 was equivalent to only a grade 8 or 9 in the white schools. This left many Africans lacking the necessary skills to handle a more modern working environment, and has resulted in a very high rate of unemployment and poverty among the black population.

In South Africa today, there is a major lack of housing, especially in urban areas where there is a shortage of 1.5 million houses. Much of this housing is substandard. One out of five black households has running water, while all white households have this simple convenience. 21 million people do not have adequate sanitation. To improve the quality and standard of living for Africans, development of infrastructure in and around towns and cities is necessary. There is a need for modern housing with sewer systems and running water. Paved roads, electricity and telephone lines would further improve quality of life. By employing future owners to build the houses, jobs will be created. People will begin to take pride in the ownership, and will be motivated to continue to work to create a better life for themselves. South Africa lacks an established middle class. The creation of these homes and subsequent jobs would raise the socioeconomic status of this poorest class. The government can also work to create a more just

distribution of income. The South African government has a current deficit of 8%, which makes it difficult to integrate any social programming. Building these houses will reduce unemployment rates, which will increase gross domestic product and government revenue. A degree of social programming can then be implemented to sustain the new middle class and provide more support for the poorest. This further development of the country's infrastructure and government programs would play a large part in improving quality of life.

South Africa's children are its future. They will become the country's leaders. If they have been raised on the streets with exposure to nothing but racism and violence, they will perpetuate the cycle of racial prejudices. Every child must be granted a good education, regardless of social class or financial situation. Compulsory education is often the only way for one to escape the cycle of poverty and to improve his economic status. An academic curriculum is necessary so that each child has the potential to excel in any field. Social justice, equality of races, respect, and ecological concern is necessary to counteract the negative influences of environment. Children are the future of South Africa. Education enhances self-esteem, provides opportunity, shapes values and morals, and changes a nation.

Apartheid is the cause of many present-day problems in South Africa. The relocation of the black people to homelands and townships has resulted in high population density and impoverished, undeveloped townships. An inadequate education system during apartheid has allowed very high unemployment rates and racism. Compulsory and quality education for all races is vital. As well, one must provide programs which encourage and enable home ownership and pride. With improved education and modern infrastructure initiatives, one could realize the elimination of the lasting effects of apartheid.

Lack of Compassion For Homeless People

Society's compassion is lacking. The overall attitude suggests that homeless people are an inconvenience for the rest of society. It is this prejudice attitude that stops society from solving the bigger issue of homelessness. This problem exists because there are many preconceptions on the type of people who are homeless. Those living on the streets are stereotyped as scary and disheveled looking people. As well as considered eyesores when seen in well populated public areas. Homeless children seem to reach the hearts of some, whereas those who are considered homeless adults are stripped of all compassion. Society's attitude towards homeless people is horrific; however, it can be changed by educating people or by financially supporting the homeless.

There are many reasons for why people become homeless, but most end up in the same place, the streets. From here, they are all classified as the same, homeless. This is where society starts with its prejudice attitude, by stereotyping the homeless as worthless bums. Stereotypes do not involve specifics or details about individuals; they just stamp a group of people as the same. When relations are made between people it is easier to be compassionate, although, some people may find it harder to relate to those who are homeless. Stereotypes are made by people's ignorance. However, it is possible to teach one how to look past the stereotypes. Although some people are less willing to learn than others, education allows people to make thoughtful and insightful judgments and opinions. Society's attitude can become one of compassion by understanding the lives of those who are homeless.

In looking at the problem from another perspective, a second solution involves local people financially supporting homeless individuals. Many citizens support people in third world countries, in the same way homeless people can be supported. By offering such an opportunity, society would be confronting the issue of homelessness. The first step towards an empathetic attitude is recognizing and acknowledging the issue. However, this solution would involve a smaller percentage of society because not everyone can or wants to give money. If individuals have already made negative preconceptions it is hard to expect that they will be willing to support financially.

Society has a prejudice attitude towards the homeless; this attitude must change to become one of compassion. By educating or financially supporting homeless people in the community, homelessness is addressed and is not ignored. Although, both solutions can work, educating people would be the most beneficial. More people would be open to being educated rather than being financially supportive. Education does not set any one back, but rather allows one to gain a thoughtful understanding of a topic. From there they can make a logical and reasonable opinion. When society changes its attitude towards the homeless, the community will be one step closer to solving the greater problem of homelessness.

The Essence of Dying

There comes a point in everybody's life when they face a blatant reminder of their mortality. Everybody must die, though not everyone in the same manner. Some people would prefer that their death be on their own terms. Euthanasia has been accepted in a few regions, and has always met heavy resistance on the way due to its moral insecurity while resting on the conscious mind of many a populace. Euthanasia should be left to the discretion of the person in consideration of the procedure seeing as other members of society, including those in a position of political or religious power, have no real connection to individuals making personal decisions.

Euthanasia is the painless ending of a life in order to prevent suffering due to an incurable illness or coma. There are a few ways by which patients can be voluntarily euthanized. The first method is by lethal injection. The patient is given a sedative that puts them into a comatose state, and then a drug that stops the heart. This is called active euthanasia and is illegal in all countries but the Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg and certain states in the United States. Passive euthanasia includes the removal of life support or the withholding of food and fluids. Passive euthanasia is legal in more countries than active euthanasia, but countries like Turkey and New Zealand still fight for their freedom to control other people's choices regarding death. Euthanasia and its morality has been a debated topic for a long time. In 2002, 79% of Canadians were reported to be in favour of a patient being able to ask their doctor for assistance in dying (Gallup Poll, 2002).

Euthanization is morally feasible when a person who is terminally ill or suffering from pain related to untreatable illness asks for it; or if a person designated by the patient in question decides it is the correct decision if the patient is comatose or otherwise unable to make the decision themselves. Though not always, quite often people opposed to euthanasia are very tied to religion or out of date traditions. Many take a closed minded approach to euthanasia in saying that it is wrong, or even going as far as to say that it is selfish and cowardly. Much of the catholic faith is based on the view that a body does not belong to the person inhabiting it, and so it is not theirs to abandon. However, if it is God's will that persons keep their life until they are no longer able then perhaps it is up to Him to ensure that the life is worth living until the very end. If God is the priority decision maker regarding end of life decisions, then the person to whom the life belongs is by default the secondary decision maker. This means that other people have absolutely no say in what a person decides to do with their death and unless God steps in, it is that person's decision to make. Quality of life is a huge factor when considering euthanasia. Not everyone gets the luxury of drifting off into a gentle sleep when they die. Not everyone gets to go for a jog the morning they die. Consider a young man or woman, at their physical climax, who suffers total paralysis from a car accident. With all but their life taken away, that person should not be condemned for wanting to move on; to leave behind a bed and total dependence on care administered by others. Euthanasia is never a quick or easy choice, but everyone must die at some point. A sooner death can be considered the lesser of two evils when the contrast is a painful, unfulfilled life.

Euthanasia is not a one-sided procedure; a doctor must be present to perform the euthanization, and many of those doctors willing to perform the procedure face discrimination

and accusations. To stand up against much of society and to tell a person "I will help you" is not easy. An issue with discrediting euthanasia patients and doctors is that the people on the critical end are not experiencing what the patients are. They have not reached the point in their life where they know firsthand all of the reasons that one may consider euthanization. Furthermore, they may not appreciate the sacrifice that the doctors are making in order to improve the wellbeing of the patients, through helping them on to the next step.

Euthanasia may not be everybody's choice, but those who choose to encounter death on their own terms when fighting an unwinnable battle should be given the proper help they need, as long as there is a person willing to help. In many countries, persons do not have the help they need available. This is an issue because persons are suffering unnecessary pain when there is a possible solution for them that simply is not readily available. Morality and religion are tied. Whether a person's morality is formed by an upbringing in a religion, or leads a person into a religion, morality factors into religion. The law factors into free will. In a society that holds a separation of church and state, it is lawful for euthanization to be legal as the moral standpoints that withhold euthanization as a practice are stemmed in religion. Life and freedom of choice, as rights, are in parity with freedom of death.
