TV NEWS SCRIPT

(5 second video clip of inappropriate music video).

<u>Reporter</u>: (Standing in front of Mothers house) "Most music videos are supposed to be sweet and have a heartfelt message, but not this one. Karonika Tisdale has brought us a very dirty video that corrupts others, her younger fans."

(Clip children watching inappropriate music video).

Reporter: (Still standing in front of mother's house) "Are music videos becoming more violent and explicit? I ask a concerned mother, that's worried that her children are idolizing the wrong celebrity."

Reporter: (Inside of Mothers house) "Do music videos today give kids the wrong idea"?

<u>Mother</u>: (*Mother sitting down on a couch*) "I'm concerned that my daughter is watching the wrong music videos Ex. Karonika Tisdale and its giving her the wrong idea. Every time Karonika's music video comes on, my daughter sings along to the bad words and tries to copy her dirty moves I try to tell her that Karonika is a bad influence but she just whines and I hate that."

Reporter: "Do you do anything to try and persuade your daughter to find another person to look up to?"

<u>Mother</u>: (Still sitting down on couch) "I know my daughter is looking up to the wrong person but besides Karonika's bad song and video her other songs were great! I try to help her like a different celebrity but she absolutely adores her."

<u>Reporter</u>: (Standing on the street) "I then ask one of Karonika's biggest fans on her take of her music video."

<u>Reporter</u>: (Asking a fan in her room) "Do you think Karonika's song and video is sending the right message?"

<u>Fan</u>: (Sitting on bed) "I mean sure videos are bad but for older people it's okay. They could have a clean version for younger fans."

<u>Reporter</u>: "Has the video and song affected how you act with your parents or friends?"

Fan: (Still sitting on bed) "I think that any song has effect on a person and how they act. Karonika's song I sing in class and the teachers say it's inappropriate and I want to go to her concert but my parents think it wouldn't be good for me. I believe Karonika is a great person."

Reporter: (Outside Karonika's house) "I finally caught up with Karonika Tisdale and asked her a couple of questions on her song and music video.

<u>Reporter</u>: (In Karonika's backyard) "Do you think that your music video is appropriate for your younger fans?"

<u>Karonika</u>: (Sitting on a hammock) "I love my fans and I think a fan is a person who supports the idol in what they do. My younger fans should know the difference between real and reality."

Reporter: "Would you suggest on having a clean version of the song?"

<u>Karonika</u>: (Still sitting on hammock) "I'm actually having people edit my music video for my younger fans. I watch my music videos so my fans should too. There are way worse music videos than mine."

Reporter: (Standing outside Much Music) "Since my interview with Karonika Tisdale her music video has now over a total view of 200,000,000! Her clean version has only a total of 3,000,000. Karonika is topping the music charts and is not going anywhere! Be a good parent and let your kids watch the right stuff.

(5 second ending clip of Karonika)

(Crowd laughs)

Announcer: What part?

Betsy Black: The little screen on my dash.

Announcer: Oh! You mean a GPS.

Betsy Black: (Confused) Why would they give her a name like GPS?

Announcer: It stands for Geographical Positioning System.

(Crowd laughs)

Announcer: She is actually a computer.

Betsy Black: I am not kind to say the least. If those kids are going to yell at me(I'm give right back to them two times as bad.

TV NEWS SCRIPT

Violent books, violent kids?

Intro: (5 second clip showing children reading mature violent book)

Reporter (Standing inside library): "Increasingly violent books aimed toward young teens show inappropriate acts of violence and fighting. In the bestselling book "The Hunger Games" a group of young teens are forced to fight and kill each other. The majority of the killings are disturbing and graphically explained. Are these books giving children the wrong idea about violence? This intensely violent book has some parents worried what kind of literature their children are being exposed to. Parent, Michelle Lavelle, sees these books as promoting violence to children."

Parent (Sitting at desk in an office building): "You know I've had a look at some of these books and I found them completely inappropriate for young teens. We are exposing our children to unnecessary, intense violence. A lot of these books show people fighting and killing each other in graphic ways. It portrays violence as socially acceptable and normal. When it is in fact the very opposite of normal. These books need to be censored and made unavailable to young children; it is polluting their minds with thinking that violence is acceptable in society."

Reporter (Still standing in library): "Opinions on these mature themed books are split; parents view them as a dangerous influence to their children, while readers view them as entertaining and fun."

(Movie adaption trailer of the final Harry Potter plays for 10 seconds)

Librarian (Standing on front steps of a big library): "The books are categorized in sections-teen, children, etc. - so they don't really need to have any warnings. Or to be censored in my opinion, if parents don't want their children reading these books, they shouldn't let them read them."

Reporter (In library interviewing teen girl): "Do you think that violent books make the people who read them violent?"

Teen girl (Standing in library, with a book shelf behind her): "I think that really depends on the type of person reading them. Like for me it doesn't matter because I know it's just a book. It's not like a book is going to make me go out and hurt somebody or fight with another person."

Reporter (Standing outside with library in distance, behind): "Love them or hate them these controversial books for young teens are more violent than ever. This is Jennifer Thallough for WCTV News."

(The screen fades into the group of 4 is gathered around Lynn's new car in the school parking lot of St. Laurence High School it is late in the afternoon the sun is starting to set and everyone is gawking over Lynn's car and how nice it is)

Olivia: (Excited) Man I love your new car, Lynn.

Adam: (Impressed) Red is the nicest color.

(Tyson leans over to Adam and says something just loud enough everyone can hear)

Tyson: Adam, you know it doesn't matter how "pretty" the car is jt's the driver that makes the difference and girls can't drive.

Adam: Yeah, girls are constantly checking themselves out in the mirror and reapplying their lipstick.

Lynn: (sarcastically) is that so?

Tyson: Yeah, Erica just crashed the other week because she was looking at some cat in the ditch then she hit a stop sign.

(Tyson and Adam laugh together)

Lynn: Well $_{\mathfrak{I}}$ if you think girls are so bad at driving how about a race?

Olivia: Yeah, then we'll know for sure who the better driver is.

Tyson: But we can't street racing's illegal.

Olivia: You're just scared we'll win.

Adam: Tyson, how about we race them up by your Uncles cabin that would be a good road to race on it's only about 4 miles from here.

Lynn: Sounds good to me, Tyson.

Tyson: (excited) You're on!

(The screen gently fades out then fades back in to a new scene where it's just about dark and when they get to the road. Lynn and Tyson are parked beside each other and they roll down their car windows.)

Lynn: (tauntingly) Are you sure your ready little Tyson?

(Lynn and Olivia giggle. Olivia and Adam count to 3)

Olivia and Adam: (unison) 1, 2, 3 GO!!!!!!!!!

(Their cars screech forward and their off like a hat) Over time Lynn and Tyson stay at pretty much the same pace.)

Tyson: Man we've got them I'm just holding them here.

Adam: (laughing) I know! Hey look at that black motorcycle.

(Tyson looks over and slows down the car slightly; just long enough for Lynn to pull in front of him.)

Olivia: Look Lynn we're beating them.

Lynn: (Excited) I know and we're only 60 meters away from finish!

Tyson: Oh Crap!!!!

(Tyson steps on the gas but it's too late Lynn's already crossed the finish line. Lynn and Olivia get out of their car.)

Lynn and Olivia: (Unison) Yes, we won that'll teach them!

Adam: (sadly) We're never gonna live this one down.

(Tyson and Adam get out of Tyson's car and walk over to the girls.)

Tyson: `Man that's not fair we were checking out the motorcycle rematch?

Lynn: No, it's getting late and besides I thought you said only girls get distracted.

Olivia: Turns out girls aren't such bad drivers after all.

(Screen gradually fades out and credits appear)
