Summary: This video is a documentary of Antonio Joao's flight from Angola to South Africa at age 11, when his parents were killed. There he lived hand to mouth, finally stowing away on a freighter. He arrived in Vancouver on Sept. 2, 2001, only 9 days before the September 11th terrorist attacks. Consequently his treatment as a refugee claimant under the Canadian Refugee system was different than it would be today. The study guide uses Antonio's experiences as reference points to investigate social injustice issues in Africa and Canada.

Some, like Rosa Parks, were not originally in positions of political power but came out of the ranks of regular citizens to stand up for human rights. Others, like Oscar Romero, archbishop of El Salvador, used their power to change the status quo. Also included are Helen Suzman, a South African member of parliament who fought apartheid; Aung San Suu Kyi, who spent years under house arrest for protesting the dictatorship in Burma; and the people of Egypt, who recently brought down the repressive government of Hosni Mubarak.
